

## Summary of the SA White Paper on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities

- The South African government developed a White Paper on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities in 2015 to provide a comprehensive framework for promoting and protecting the rights of persons with disabilities.
- The White Paper recognizes that persons with disabilities face numerous barriers to full and equal participation in society and seeks to promote their empowerment and integration into all aspects of society.
- The White Paper identifies five key priority areas: (1) Accessibility and Universal Design; (2) Education and Skills Development; (3) Employment and Economic Empowerment; (4) Health and Rehabilitation; and (5) Social Protection and Inclusion.
- The White Paper also emphasizes the need for cross-sectoral collaboration between government departments, civil society, and persons with disabilities themselves to achieve its goals.
- The White Paper sets out a number of policy measures to support its objectives, including the development of legislation and regulations to protect the rights of persons with disabilities, the establishment of institutional mechanisms to coordinate and monitor implementation, and the provision of funding and support to promote accessibility and inclusion.
- The White Paper recognizes the diversity of disabilities and the need to ensure that policies and programs are responsive to the specific needs and experiences of different groups.
- The White Paper highlights the importance of promoting awareness and understanding of disability issues in society and of combatting stigma and discrimination against persons with disabilities.
- The White Paper reaffirms South Africa's commitment to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities and the African Union Disability Rights Framework, and recognizes the role of international cooperation in promoting disability rights.
- The implementation of the White Paper is an ongoing process, and progress is monitored through the National Disability Rights Machinery and the National Disability Rights Monitoring Committee.
