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Welcome to the third International Conference on Disability Rights

The Faculty of Law, in partnership with the Centre for Universal Access and Disability Support (CUADS), Faculty of Education, Health Science, the South African Human Rights Commission (SAHRC) and the National Council of & for Persons with Disabilities, proudly presents the third International Conference on Disability Rights, held on 04-05 June 2026 in Bloemfontein, South Africa.

The third International Conference on Disability Rights seeks to move the conversation beyond compliance toward universal access as a driver of innovation, equality, and justice. The event sought to reimagine accessibility not as accommodation for a few, but as a universal design principle that benefits society as a whole. The conference will engage with the global framework of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) and the Protocol to the African Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities In Africa (Africa Disability Protocol), connecting these instruments to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), notably SDG 4 (Quality Education), SDG 8 (Decent Work and Economic Growth), SDG 10 (Reduced Inequalities), and SDG 11 (Sustainable Cities and Communities), which promote inclusion and empowerment for persons with disabilities and the pursuit of universal access.

The third International Conference on Disability Rights aims to:

- Critically assess current policies, practices, and societal attitudes that shape accessibility and inclusion for persons with disabilities.
- Foster interdisciplinary dialogue on emerging issues, innovative solutions, and practical strategies for advancing disability justice and universal design.
- Build partnerships among academics, policymakers, practitioners, civil society, and representative organisations of persons with disabilities.
- Identify gaps in legal and policy frameworks and propose actionable recommendations for implementation at local, regional, and international levels.
- Highlight accessibility innovations, including technological, architectural, legal, and social, that exemplify universal access in action.

The programme centres on four pillars:

- Foundations of Rights and Social Change
- Legal Frameworks and Governance
- The Built and Digital Environment
- Life Stages, Community, Development and Economic Justice

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Commissioner Nomahlubi Khwinana

South African Human Rights Commission



Nomahlubi Khwinana is an admitted attorney with over two decades of experience and the founding Director of Mtimkulu Khwinana Attorneys since 2001. She has served as an acting judge of the Gauteng High Court since 2020, contributing to jurisprudence through her judgments.

Beyond the courtroom, she is a committed activist against Gender-Based Violence and Femicide (GBVF), a feminist, and the National Coordinator of the South African Women Lawyers Association (SAWLA) Student Chapter, where she mentors aspiring women lawyers. Her leadership extends into community work and organisations such as SAWLA, the National Democratic Lawyers Association (NEDEL), and the Lady Peace Community Foundation (LOPECO). Currently, she continues her lifelong dedication to justice, equality, and human rights.

Dr Zukiswa Yoliswa Zinhle Nzo

Research Fellow – Free State Centre for Human Rights



Zukiswa Yoliswa Zinhle Nzo is a Research Fellow at the University of the Free State's Free State Centre for Human Rights in the Faculty of Law. She is an inclusion researcher, social entrepreneur, and facilitator with over 16 years of experience spanning government, academia, civil society, and the private sector. She holds a PhD in Social Governance from Waseda University (Japan), and her work is grounded in a deep commitment to human rights, intersectional justice, and inclusive development.

Her academic and professional trajectory was profoundly shaped by a life-altering experience of disability following a gunshot injury in her youth—an event that intensified her pursuit of justice and equity, particularly for those historically marginalised. This formative experience, along with early community advocacy, led to her selection as a Mandela Washington Fellow, where she was recognised for her leadership in disability inclusion and her dedication to mentorship and training of emerging change agents.

Dr. Nzo's work is deeply intergenerational and rooted in lived experience. She mentors and advocates alongside youth, women, and persons with disabilities, with a strong belief in the transformative power of equitable systems. She has collaborated with global institutions including the United Nations, OHCHR, JICA, and GIZ, contributing to initiatives in digital inclusion, independent living, empowerment and rights monitoring, and inclusive policy development across the African continent and globally.

Her leadership was recently marked by her appointment as Co-Chair of the Civil Society 20 (C20) under South Africa's G20 Presidency—a historic milestone for disability inclusion at multilateral levels. Her nomination by the South African disability sector reflects a collective assertion of visibility, voice, and capability within high-level global governance spaces.

A recipient of the Social Transformation Award, Dr Nzo has also served on the Presidential Working Group on Disability in South Africa. She is a published author and international speaker whose contributions span topics such as disability, ageing, economic justice, accessible transport, and the systemic exclusion of disability from global development agendas. She holds multiple governance roles, where she continues to champion ethical leadership, inclusive innovation, and sustainable transformation. At the core of her work is the conviction that fairness when embedded in law, policy, and institutional design is the cornerstone of just and sustainable societies.

Dr. Ashley Subbiah is the Head of Business Development at Sensory Logix, where he leads solutions-driven initiatives focused on expanding access to assistive technology across education, government, corporate, and community sectors in Southern Africa. His work centres on strategic partnerships, accessibility innovation, Braille literacy, digital inclusion, and the development of scalable assistive technology ecosystems that promote independence and inclusion for persons with disabilities.

He holds a PhD in Biology from the University of KwaZulu-Natal (UKZN) and has extensive experience in accessibility, disability inclusion, assistive technology, and inclusive education support. Having lost his sight completely due to congenital glaucoma by the age of 29, Dr. Subbiah has developed specialist expertise in assistive technology, digital accessibility, and adaptive systems through both lived and professional experience.

Prior to joining Sensory Logix, he served as Manager of the Assistive Technology Centre at the South African National Council for the Blind (SANCB) and previously as Information Access Officer within the Disability Support Unit at UKZN.

Dr. Subbiah remains deeply committed to disability advocacy, accessibility advancement, and inclusive education through a range of national leadership and governance roles. He currently serves on the board of the South African Disability Alliance (SADA), is a member of the SANCB National Education Committee, as well as having served as Deputy President of the KwaZulu-Natal Blind and Deaf Society, and Treasurer of the Higher Education Disability Services Association (HEDSA). He also previously served as Chair of the 2025 South African Disability-20 (D20) Steering Committee, contributing to national dialogue on disability inclusion, accessibility, and empowerment.
